## CONFERENCE OF TEEN-AGE GIRLS ENDS ON SUN

One Hundred Seventy Delegates From 14 Chur. Attend Two-day Session

LEADERS GATHER Impressive Addresses by Miss A. Fountain Are Feature of Gathering

The Nanaimo District Girls' Conference held in its city Saturday afternoon was an outstanding success and the response most gratifying to the local committee. One hundred and seventy-five leaders and members were expected and prepared for giving the splendid interest created during the weeks of planning and preparation.

Forteen churches and districts were represented, LadySmith, Cedar, South Wellington, Brechin, Lantz, East Wellington and locally, St. Paul's Anglican, Baptist, Five Star Union, Gospel, Methodist, Mission, St. Andrew's, Scotch, and Miss Clara Maxwell of New Westminster, leader of the Girls' Work in that city, and coming to the conference representing the entire province were given an opportunity to speak and were greatly appreciated by both leaders and girls.

Success of the conference was due to a great measure to the distribution made by Miss Annie Fountain, Provincial Girls' Work secretary, and her address both Saturday and Sunday were outstanding. Her keen understanding of the girls' work with her simple, yet direct manner of presentation, made her messages very impressive, as she unfolded the message there "I am" and "We are."

Leaders Gather At 12:30 Saturday noon twenty leaders from Nanaimo and District came together for the leaders' luncheon served in St. Andrew's United Church. This gave an opportunity to become better acquainted and to discuss various details of the Conference. The chairman, Miss Mary Hart, presided, and briefly outlined the Conference, so that the leaders might be familiar with all the details. All agreed that this was a splendid start for the week-end activities.

The afternoon sessions were very interesting and helpful to the girls. In them were displayed numerous exhibits of handicraft, world friendship, G.O.L.T. and leadership. This collection of material showed a very real manner of the training-teen-age girls are receiving in their mid-week activities.

Another very interesting thing was the demonstration of singing activities by the 1st Nanaimo Girl Guides, under the direction of their leader, Capt. A. E. Jenkinson. This display was very complete and well executed. The singing was served by the Girls' Choir, and a hearty vote of thanks goes to the ladies of that church for their fine co-operation.

The evening session was spent in a very happy conference, and in the afternoon every day problems of teen-age girls. A pageant "World Friendship" was presented by the girls of St. Andrew's United Church.

## Moscow Charges Nipponese Have Manchukuo Base

Manifesto Asserts Soviet Is Ready To Act Quickly Should Occasion Arise

AIR FLEET THREAT

Moscow, Nov. 13.—Japanese Imperialists are charged with creating an armed base in Manchukuo in a manifesto issued by the far eastern section of the Communist party.

Warning Russia is prepared to act quickly in the event of Japanese attacks on aggression in the far east, the manifesto said.

"Our air fleet is prepared to deal decisive blows at enemy centres of population. With such an array of terrible armament, the Soviet Union would readily kill any desire to compete against our program of peaceful labor."

Issued Nov. 1—Two days before Russia protested to Tokyo against the alleged flight of Japanese army planes over Soviet territory, the manifesto emphasizes Russia's desire for peace.

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## NAZI ARE GIVEN AN OVERWHELMING POPULAR ACCLAIM

Hitler Obtains His Mandate By Vast Majority At Polls Early Today

TERRIFIC VOTE

But Over Three Million Have Courage To Register a Protest To Reichstag

Berlin, Nov. 13.—Adolf Hitler is armed with the almost unanimous support of his people today to press his bold drive toward a new deal for Germany.

More than 90 per cent of the qualified voters cast ballots in yesterday's Reichstag election and foreign policy plebiscite, and well over 90 per cent of those electors rung up a resounding "Ja" (yes) for the Chancellor and his Nazi party.

Today the entire nation joined in a celebration of the event hailed by Nazi party leaders as a "miracle of Germany becoming one people."

No sooner had the result been indicated than propaganda Minister Goebbels, whose work figured large in the big turnout at the polls, called for a day-long demonstration.

Jubilant Nazis saw Hitler yesterday as the party following from 17 to 40 million voters as they cast their yesterday's results with the elections of last March 5.

Besides, he got another Reichstag which will take orders willingly.

For the Nazi slate of Reichstag candidates the vote as reported by Wolff's Agency, was 95,214,347, or 92.2 per cent of the total ballots cast, invalid votes 3,348,125 or 7.8 per cent.

In the plebiscite by which the nation approved Hitler's foreign policy stand, the count was: "Yes" 40,583,430 or 93.5 per cent; "No" 2,052,100 or 4.7 per cent; Invalid 789,999 or 18 per cent.

Today there was no immediate indication as to what Hitler proposed to do about the overwhelming support thrust upon him.

The plebiscite was interpreted as approval of Germany's withdrawal from the League of Nations, and her said to be believed the present negotiations are doomed to failure in their existing form.

## CENTRAL BANK FOR CANADA IS FAVORABLE BY COMMISSIONERS

Institution, It Is Asserted, Will Facilitate Inter-Empire Trade; Need For Monetary Co-operation

Canadian Bank Members Oppose Idea Which Will Be Probed by Parliament During Coming Year

Ottawa, Nov. 13.—Canada will have a privately-owned Central Bank, capitalized at \$5,000,000, if the majority recommendation of the Royal Commission on Banking is implemented by parliament at the coming session. This is along the line of action already taken, or about to be taken by other Dominions of the Empire.

If established, Canada's Central Bank may prove a link in a structure designed to facilitate intra-Imperial business.

Such an institution is declared a necessity if the Dominion is to keep pace with changing conditions in the financial and economic worlds. The Central bank, according to the report will not only facilitate intra-Imperial trade, it will perform useful and important functions in connection with international monetary co-operation. And the commission asserts "the need for international monetary co-operation is urgent."

Members of the proposed central bank are suggested in the report. Outstanding among them are the proposals the new institution shall have the sole right of note issue, and it shall be privately-owned. The capital, it is suggested, should be subscribed by British subjects resident in Canada. Excess profits should go to the government. The governor of the bank, his deputy and directors would be in the first instance, to be appointed by the government, and later by shareholders subject to government approval.

Canadian Oppose The Commission personnel found it impossible to agree on the main recommendation for a central bank. The two members from across the sea, Lord MacMillan and Sir Charles Adair, with Hon. J. E. Brownlee, criticized the majority which carried the recommendation. They opposed were the Canadian banker members, Sir Thomas White, former Finance Minister, and Beaudry Leman, general manager of La Banque Canadienne Nationale and a former president of the Canadian Bankers' Association.

The commission refers to the fact already South Africa and Australia have central banks, now "an indispensable element in the financial machinery of the Empire. It is recommended that legislation be drafted to establish similar institutions.

That the present is an inopportune time for trying out the central bank idea is objected by Sir Thomas White and Beaudry Leman, in their dissent, and statements which accompany the recommendation. Com. Brownlee, while agreeing with the central bank, found himself in opposition to the proposal inasmuch as it is privately owned. He expressed the view that the Government should provide capital for the institution, and appointment of officers remain with the government.

To Probe Report Parliament, when it meets early in the new year, will have before it the commission report of more than 100 pages. During the present session the legislature must undertake the sixth revision of the Bank Act. It is with a view to this important legislative enactment the commission was appointed. Consequently the coming session will see a discussion of the proposal inasmuch as well as the others contained in the document. It appears very likely, however, Parliament will find itself in sympathy with views of the commission majority which is privately owned.

Unanimously the commission recommends establishment of an organization for extension of intermediate and short-term agricultural credit. The specific form of this organization is not given, but it is recommended a further investigation on this point take place.

Abandonment of the statutory minimum interest rate of seven per cent is recommended. This is a provision of the Bank Act. Four of the commissioners favored abandonment of the maximum, but Commissioner Brownlee took the view it still served a useful purpose, and dissented from this recommendation.

The contention banks should withdraw from the investment business did not meet with the support of the commission. Its members recommended that the banks be recognized as banks, with their widespread branches, could give in the flotation of Dominion, provincial and municipal securities.

## BRITAIN STANDS BY LEAGUE; HENDERSON MAY RESIGN POST

Italy Notifies Geneva of Other Negotiations To Tariff Trade, Today

Failure Threatens

London, Nov. 13.—Great Britain stands by the League of Nations; she invites Germany's return to the League and Disarmament Conference, but she will have no part to the destruction of the League. Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald emphatically made this clear in the House of Commons this afternoon. MacDonald left the House in no doubt as to the government's stand. He declared it stood for international disarmament agreement which would include Germany.

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London, Nov. 13.—It is authorized today by the League of Nations that Arthur Henderson, chairman of the World Disarmament Conference, is so dissatisfied with the failure of various governments to push on toward disarmament agreement that he is contemplating tendering his resignation.

## CREW OF VESSEL REACH EDMONTON

Twelve Members of M. S. Mabel Are Still At Poplar Point, In North

Edmonton, Nov. 13.—Comrades of the treacherous shore ice trail along the Athabasca River from Poplar Point to Fort McMurray, a distance of 80 miles, the second party of six men from the icebound motorboat Mabel have reached here.

Crawling on hands and knees over thin ice during darkness, members of the party risked their lives just before they reached Fort McMurray Thursday night. All managed to complete the hazardous trip safely.

The party made the trip in four days of steady walking along the shore. They rested for a day at McKay's, their actual time was five days from the boat to Fort McMurray.

In the party were James Blatchford, engineer on the Motorboat North Star, and son of the late K. A. Blatchford, ex-M.P.; L. H. Harlett, mate, and D. Wheatford, deckman, on the Ogvik; Clifford Johnson, of Athabasca, truck driver last season on the Fort McMurray; W. H. Buchanan, of this city; and C. R. Savage, employed at the Imperial Oil Company's plant at Fort Norman.

The first to arrive here from the Mabel were John Brown and Andrew Nelson, who reached the city ten days ago from Waterways.

There are still 12 members of the Mabel's crew and passengers at Poplar Point. As soon as an aeroplane is available, they will be brought to Fort McMurray. They are living on the barge frozen in near the motorboat and are in no danger of running short of food supplies.

## CRUEL ROX ON CANADIAN PEOPLE

Takes From People Their Only Protection Against Usury, Says McGeer

Vancouver, Nov. 13.—"While I am disinclined to comment on the report in its abbreviated form," said C. G. McGeer, K.C., M.L.A.-elect, who has devoted many years of study of banking reform, "I regard its provisions as wholly inadequate."

"If the report in its condensed form correctly interprets the commission's opinion, it is a cruel blow on the Canadian people. There is nothing in its proposals which were not in the English Bank Act of 1844."

It sets up a bankers' central bank, and takes from the public the only protection against usury, by the removal of the seven per cent limitation clause.

There is nothing that should comment on the report to the Canadian Parliament, neither anything calculated to advance the commerce and industry of the country, nor which will assist the country in recovery from the present depression.

## PRAIRIES SUFFER DAMAGE BY STORM

High Winds, Rain and Sleet Are Responsible For Failure of Power Service

Winnipeg, Nov. 13.—Stormy weather has, since Saturday, snow and sleet accompanied by heavy cyclonic winds—left a path of property damage, drifted right-ways and broken communication lines in Manitoba and Saskatchewan during the week-end. In contrast, Alberta enjoyed the warm breezes of a Chinook.

Winnipeg, Regina, and Saskatoon were worst off, with heavy rain followed by snow. Property damage was extensive in Regina with smashed roofs, broken signs and toppled chimneys. Winnipeg and Saskatchewan had minor damage with interruptions to light and power services. Virdein, in southwestern Manitoba, also reported property damage.

Milder conditions were in prospect today. Fair and milder was the forecast for all Prairie Provinces.

Edmonton, Nov. 13.—Roofs were torn loose, electric light and trolley lines poles leveled and large areas of pavement as a terrific northwest wind caused thousands of dollars damage here early Saturday.

## Old City Landmark At Court House To Go

Flagpole, Which Has Become Unsafe, To Be Taken Down; Another Will Be Erected In Its Place

An old landmark of Nanaimo, the flag pole in front of the Provincial Courthouse, on Front Street, which has become unsafe, will soon disappear. This morning, Mr. G. N. Cathay, of the Department of Public Works, and a number of local men, commenced work which will be climaxed by its removal.

A 60 foot "gin pole" will be erected and the flag pole will be dropped in this manner. The flag pole is approximately 135 feet high and will be replaced by another although it is not known what length the new one will be. The present pole is one of the tallest in B. C.

#### University Man Believes This Would Prevent War

Calgary, Nov. 13—Appointment of an international commission to control trade in minerals would be effective in checking war, according to Dr. R. C. Wallace, president of the University of Alberta, who addressed the Calgary Board of Trade over the weekend.

The proposed commission, he said, would regulate mineral production and distribution, guarding against any nation receiving more minerals than necessary for normal life. The commission would be responsible to the League of Nations and if war threatened it could curtail immediately the mineral distribution.
