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### GEORGE YOUNG IN TRAINING FOR SWIM

Despite his failure to even make a second Wrigley marathon, publicistic of the world's championship for long distance swimming, George Young, a Canadian, has been graciously handed him by Young's writers and others, George Young gives every indication of a comeback in the blue ring of the sporting world this year.

It must be remembered that he is not just a promoter—and a very shy one. He is more than merely a promoter. He is a swimmer, and he is capable in his pools of it in his home town. Looking back on it, a lot of his very misadventures, and whether they were or were not properly trained and conditioned for the long race, and the question that was disturbing Young is back with original coach and his different surroundings. He is back with his original coach, Johnny Walker, who is probably been a father and son in the years gone by. He has maintained his original coaching and training, and he has put on much weight, that is true, but it does not seem to have slowed him to any extent, and he has been swimming in Lake Ontario since the middle of May, sometimes in temperatures as low as 50 degrees and lower, without experiencing any discomfort.

It is consistent to say that when he goes to the pool he will have all his old confidence and his physical shape should be the best of his year. He will have a very good swimmer, and he has maintained, although to date he has not forwarded his entry to the Canadian National Exhibition.

**Australian Star Enters Marathon**

He has cultivated a strong back, better kick, better freestyle, as his knee, years incurred during the swim last year made him ill-able, made straight back an impossibility. He will be a factor in the third marathon.

George Creagan of Paterson, N.J., is strongly at the Hammer and will be thoroughly accredited by swim time. George is a Scotsman, and swimming instructor. He holds one Peak trophy, among which is a swim round Manhattan Island, aided by the tide both ways, in which he averaged over 30 miles per hour. He also claims the time record for a swim from Albany to New York. He has been in the Lake George marathon twice, and last year he swam in the Michigan, was forced out by cramps.

**Many Favor Mendall Burditt**

Many say that the best bet of the swim time is Mendall Burditt, the Canadian boy who made such a name for himself last year, coming to Nanaimo to export coaching of any kind. Burditt is a protégé of Sir Henry Thornton, president of the Canadian National Railway, by whom he is employed as a clerk, and has been training all year under the capable care of Captain Walker. Canadian representative in 1924, Walker, himself, is no mean distance swimmer and stated that Burditt is the best endurance man he has ever handled, with speed to burn when necessary.

### ENGINEERS BATTLE TO TAME LIGHTNING

New York, July 17.—In a battle to tame lightning—electrical engineers are "digging in" on top of a lonely Tennessee mountain for a campaign that may last six months or six years.

Lightning to date, experts say, has remained an unknown quantity and has hampered operation in long distance high power electrical lines.

The "Battle of Chickamauga Mountain" where an average of 20 thunder storms a month occur, the engineers say, will reveal characteristics of lightning that scientists have sought for centuries. The camp will be located at Chata, Tennessee. Westinghouse Electric & Manufacturing Co. engineers will make up the army.

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Norinder on geologists, physics, hydrology, etc., will guide the heavy artillery. The apparatus, using the power lines of the Aluminum Company of America, will cover a five-mile wilderness.

The interest of scientists is centered on the geologists, brought to this country by Dr. Harold Norinder after eight year work in Sweden as engineer and head of the research bureau of the Royal Board of Waterfalls in Stockholm. He is now a Westing-

house consulting engineer.

The oscillograph operates much like the hidden automatic cameras which still-frames are made to "snap" their own pictures. It is stabled on the power line, it keeps watch without attention. Any sort of lightning, from the smallest spark to a 100 million flash a half mile long, leaves an exact record of its performance. The device measures the rate of rise of the voltage surge, the maximum voltage attained, the duration of the charge and the rate of decrease.

It is so sensitive that it records surges which have an ephemeral life of only a few millionths of a second—the time taken for an ordinary rifle bullet to travel the thickness of two hairs, engineers say.

The moving parts consist of a beam of cathode rays which are bent here and there by electrical attraction to leave their mark on a drum of photographic film spinning at 100 revolutions per second. The chief apparatus is 18 inches in diameter.

The klydograph will record the maximum shock received by the transmission line and thus supplement the oscillograph records. Ouson will function as sort of distance finders to tell the operators how far distant from the power line the lightning flashed. The cameras will record any lightning within their range.

All devices are automatic. Incoming phonostations will give warning by ringing a bell calling the engineers into action.

**CITY COUNCIL BOARD**

**WE'LL LAST EVENING**

The City Council met in regular session last evening with His Worship Mayor Busby presiding, the full board being in attendance. The principal business before the meeting was the resignation of AM Hart, chairman of the Waterworks Committee, whose resignation was presented at the previous meeting of the Council, due to a letter forwarded to the Council by Mr. Rawson, waterworks caretaker, as follows:

City Waterworks, Nanaimo, B.C. To His Worship the Mayor, and Council.

Gentlemen—The time has arrived whereby I am compelled to complain of AM Hart's activities towards the City Waterworks. If AM Hart has any fault to find with me he should state his complaint before the Council or the superintendent, and not around the house. I am working under orders from the superintendent, and I told AM Hart in no uncertain tone that he is not the Boss, and further, I want to state that he is an irresponsible interfering human, and has endangered the health of the public by tapping one of the violet swamps on the Island. I can give further data on this if it is required, but I reported his intentions to the engineer in 1927, and to the superintendent on the 15th of May, 1928. The superintendent told me to keep track of his actions, but unfortunately the South Fork line was broken by a tree falling over it, and it was impossible to get this line running, so I was unable to follow his actions on the 16th, when he released it. When I told him he was not the Boss, he replied that he would show me; he would get me fired. I am appealing to you to see that I am not so treated in privacy even though the city provides the house. His intention is evident, it is not the city's interests he is out for, trailing out here all the time. I am well aware that there has got to be a clown in every circus but when he becomes dangerous it is time for an understanding.

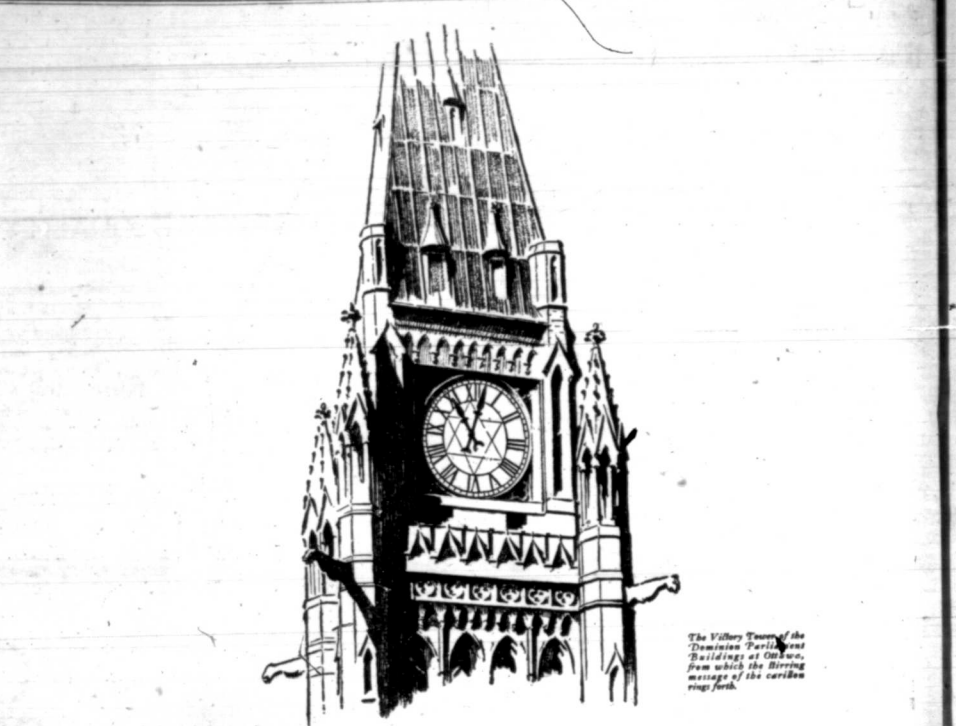

**SCOTLAND YARD PLANS DEVICE TO CHECK BANDITS**

A recent dispatch from London, England, would seem to show that the days of the motor bandit in England are numbered. By a ingenious device for barricading main roads, Scotland Yard believes it has solved the problem of preventing these bandits from escaping after perpetrating holdups.

For almost a year numerous experiments have been carried out by the "Lard" in a London garage. The most effective trap devised so far consists of two steel drums, filled with a material to give them a weight of ten tons each, connected by wire.

The drums are anchored by a spiral spring and when not in action the locking wire will be concealed in a slot in the roadway. As soon as an alarm is circulated, the wire will be raised by a lever and the obstruction marked by red lamps.

Any automobile attempting to pass the barrier would find himself surrounded by twenty-five tons attached to his car, that is the total weight of the drums, plus resistance of the springs, which can only be stretched to an extreme length of fifty yards. Tests conducted by the police have satisfied them that the device is the most practical yet evolved.

EXPERTS DISCUSS SHIFTLSS GEARS

What is likely to be the automobile of the future, at least in a number of particulars, was discussed recently at the Summer meeting of the Society of Automotive Engineers. The various speakers talked about details of the transmission which promised motor car improvements along several lines.

One of the addresses that attracted widespread interest was that of D. Senod by Lavard, a French engineer, who described his invention of a new transmission that eliminates gear-shifting and automatically changes the speeds. He said that the operation of automobiles on the streets of Paris with the new transmission had convinced him of its practicability.

Because, with ordinary gear shift cars, the driver never operates outside the speed of engine and wheels. M. de Lavard claimed that the automatic transmission will increase the average speed possible and effect a fuel saving of more than twenty per cent. The transmission is combined with a gearless differential and a planetary reverse-gear located on the rear axle.

A long transmission shaft is driven directly from the engine and rotates an inclined "inertia hub," which changes the rotation of the shaft into reciprocating motion. Connecting the inertia hub with the drive of the rear axle are rods which, by acting on roller catches, translate the back-and-forth thrust into rotary motion applied by the axle to the wheels.

The transmission consists of the shaft of the inclination of the inertia hub with the engine torque and road resistance, which automatically varies the throw of the connecting rods, consequently the rotation of the wheels and the speed of the car. This rotary transmission is combined with a gearless differential and a planetary reverse-gear located on the rear axle.
