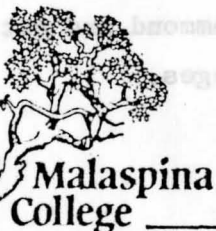

## MCCAFFRAY HEADS UP EXTERNAL STUDY TEAM

CHARLES McCAFFRAY, Principal of the College of New Caledonia, will chair the external team for the Malaspina College Self Study. His appointment was announced by Lloyd Morin, chairman of the self study steering committee of the B.C. College Principals' Council. Gerry Kilcup, Principal of the Justice Institute will be the associate chairman with the other members still to be determined. The external team orientation has been set for March 16, in Richmond, with the visit to the College scheduled for the period March 31-April 3. THE SAN FRANCISCO Guitar Quartet, a unique new ensemble featuring four equally talented young artists, James Colgan, Timothy Fox, Lynn Zemlin and Geoffrey Stewart, can be heard in concert at the College Theatre on Monday, March 2, at 8.0 p.m. In a recent review one critic wrote that the group had restored his faith in the guitar as a classical concert instrument. Monday's program will include a number of works written especially for four guitars and the mood of the music will range from intimate to outgoing and robust, from introspective to dramatic and expressive.
