merits and miracles of compost and to prove her point about the resulting gigantic rhubarb plant produced, she brought in a sample of this magnificent specimen.

Everyone was duly impressed, awed and overwhelmed at the monstrous umbrella-like leaf billowing from the sturdy pianoleg sized stem.

You may be inspired to grow mega-barbs in compost but what will you do with the crop? Sharon has thought of that too!

FAVOURITE RHUBARB CAKE

2 cups all purpose flour
half cup butter
half teaspoon salt
one teaspoon baking powder

Rub all this together

Mix in 1 beaten egg
Save three-quarters cup of this mixture for topping, spread the rest into a 8" x 12" glass pan. Spread 4 cups rhubarb (chopped in three-quarter inch pieces) over this. You can use frozen rhubarb, only thaw partially.

CUSTARD: Mix together
half cup flour
half cup melted butter
1 &-half cup sugar
2 beaten eggs

Pour Custard Mix over rhubarb. Spread remaining crumbs over custard. Sprinkle with cinnamon and sugar to taste.

Bake 1 hour at 350

Cowichan's paper recycling plan was discussed with enthusiastic input from staff.

WE PLEDGE TO REDUCE OUR USE OF PAPER BY 18% -

SO THAT WE CAN USE ONLY RECYCLED PAPER (WHICH COSTS 18% MORE)

Some of the ideas to help:

- 2 sided photocopying only
- Use blank sides of pages for memos, notes
- Use excess copies of reports for notepaper
- Circulate information/memos rather than provide individual copies
- Use E-mail
- Labelled paper recycling boxes in all office areas, photocopy areas, classrooms
- Newspapers to be stacked in coat closet, for future removal
- Be picky when ordering supplies; avoid NCR paper

As Jenny says, "we must change how we think and how we

operate." Judging by the enthusiastic response there should be no trouble in reducing paper waste by 18% so that we can begin using only recycled paper.

Inspired by the mega-barb and the recycling fervour Judy Jeffery is spearheading the Cowichan Campus Compost Challenge. "Challenge" because at the mention of compost certain staff members get positively covetous - a sure sign that the mouldering heaps of vegetation will be quickly snapped up when the time is ripe.
