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ROOTS OF PLANTS YIELD FINE DYES

Wealth of Colors Discovered Out Of Doors By Women Of Winnipeg.

Winnipeg, July 25 (CP)—In the revival of the fast-dying art of producing woollen goods from the sheep's back a group of Manitoba women went out into their gardens and found a wealth of colors, far outpassing any effects heretofore achieved with chemical dyes.

Among the exhibits at this year's exhibition of the Manitoba Handicrafts Guild were tapestries and rugs made from raw wool and dyed with vegetable colors distilled from the common garden chickweed, spinach and golden rod.

Greater advantage of using herb dyes, they think, is the perfect blend of many colors produced when spun and woven together. Unlike chemical tints, vegetable colors with which Manitoba home spinners and weavers have so far experimented never "wash" with one another.

Here are some of the effects produced after painstaking boiling and rinsing on the kitchen stove: Chickweed roots yield violet and blue; spinach leaves, yellow; birch leaves, green; golden rod flowers, yellow; red stee roots, red. Tree bark are the source of, more sombre colors:

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ECONOMY DRIVE DEEMED UNFAIR

High Court Judges Smarting Over Salary Cuts; Are "Servants of Crown"

London, July 25.—Judges of the High Court are still smarting over the cut in salaries, from £5,000 to £4,000, made during the government's economy campaign in 1931. "A grievous wrong" was how the octogenarian judge, Mr. Justice Avey, described the cut at a recent banquet at the Mansion House.

"Of even more importance, in the view of many of them, is the manner in which the cut was instituted. The government lumped together the judges with ordinary civil servants, and classed them as 'servants of the Crown.' They regard this as an indignity, and a slight upon the constitutional position they enjoy. Under the Act of Settlement the judges deem themselves independent either of Crown or Parliament. The government can neither command their services nor so much as ask them a question.

There is talk of the judges flying a Petition of Right to the King. As the law stands the petition would have to be tried in the King's Bench or the Chancery Division, or in other words the judges of the High Court would have to "sit upon themselves." This procedure is impossible, for a judge may not officiate in any action where his own interests are concerned.

Possibly the difficulty may be settled by the government restoring the judges' salaries to their old level. It is unlikely any great objection will be raised to this in the House of Commons, for most parliamentarians are agreed that at £5,000 a year a judge of the High Court is not over-paid.

Kiddies Under Age of Seven Banned in Schools at Rupert

Prince Rupert, July 25.—Children under seven years will not be admitted to Prince Rupert schools after this term. Boys and girls over 16 will be required to pay \$50 a year. Reductions in staffs of all schools and considerable reductions in teachers' salaries are also announced.
