GREAT RACE TODAY

THE GREAT RACE, Malaspina College's answer to the annual Bathtub Spectacular, was launched on an unsuspecting public a year ago to mark the move from the Kennedy Street campus. Organizer George Mapson was responsible for all the initial spadework and, on the day, the RCMP were out in force to supervise the gruelling contest. The Geography students outrolled all the opposition to complete the course in 29 minutes 34 seconds, a record that will undoubtedly be challenged when the Second Great Race is staged today at 3:30 p.m. A maximum of eight teams can take part, each comprised of eight males and five females, and the race will start from in front of the main entrance to the old College on Kennedy Street. From there the route to the finishing line outside the Welcome Centre will be by way of Fitzwilliam Street, Wallace Street, Franklin Street, Kennedy Street and on to Fourth Street for the long haul up to the winning post. Metal beer keys will again be supplied by a friendly brewer - they are rolled along the entire length of the course. George Mapson reports that the entries are filled and everyone is enthusiastic. The race starts at 3:30 p.m. and will finish about 4:00 p.m. in front of the Welcome Centre. Come out and watch and support your favorite team!

DEBATING TEAM RECORDS FIRST WIN

ON FRIDAY, MARCH 18, four students from the College, Sabba Sall, Cheryl Ongaard, Phil Larsen, and Jeremy Thornburg, travelled to Victoria to participate in the Royal Roads Invitational Debating Tournament. The resolution for debate was a difficult one, a quotation from Russian novelist Yevgeny Zamyatin: "Heretics are the sole bitter medicine against the entropy of human thought." Cheryl Ongaard deserves special thanks, as she filled in at the very last moment for another member of the team who fell ill. She and her partner, Sabba Sall, did very well considering the circumstances. The affirmative team, Jeremy Thornburg and Phil Larsen, won the award for best team, and Jeremy Thornburg won the best individual debator. Dale Lovick, the team's spiritual advisor and member of the English Department, stated in his best academic manner that "the guys done real good, and youse ain't seen nothin' yet."

LANGUAGE BURSARIES OFFERED

MORE THAN 600 BURSARIES, each worth \$800, are now available from the ministry of education and the federal government to post-secondary students in British Columbia wishing to improve their knowledge of one of Canada's official languages. The bursaries are offered as part of the Summer Language Bursary Program established six years ago to provide young Canadians with the opportunity to learn a second official language and become more familiar with the culture represented by that language. More than 7,000 bursaries are available across Canada this year, an increase of 43% over last year. Students receiving a bursary will be expected to spend a minimum of six weeks during the summer attending an immersion course in one of the official languages. Forty-three post-secondary institutions across Canada are participating in the program, including four in B.C. - Capilano College, Douglas College, the University of Victoria and The University of British Columbia. Students wishing more information on the Summer Language Bursary program, or application forms, should contact the ministry of education's student services branch, Parliament Buildings, Victoria.

A SPECIAL LECTURE, by Dr. Ann Faraday (author of Dream Power and The Dream Game) and John Wren-Lewis, will be in the Choral Room of the Music Building on Friday, April 1, at 12:30 p.m. Dr. Faraday is a psychologist who is widely known for her pioneering work on the self-interpretation of dreams. John Wren-Lewis is a well-known writer on psychology, science and religion. Dr. David Walker, from the Psychology Department at U-Vic, will be speaking on Friday, April 1 at 3:30 p.m. in the Choral Room of the Music Building. The topic of his lecture will be Low Energy Consciousness - A Solution to the Energy Crisis. Faculty, staff and students are welcome. Following Dr. Walker's talk, light refreshments will be served.
