## MALASPINA'S NUCLEAR-FREE ZONE SIGNS VANDALIZED

MEMBERS OF MALASPINA'S DISARMAMENT Group arrived on campus Monday morning to discover that their "nuclear-free zone" signs, rushed into place for the Queen's visit, had been stolen and vandalized. The large sign by the Fifth Street entrance had been blowtorched off and stolen, while the Fourth Street sign had the word "free" painted out.

"We are naturally upset by what has happened," said Jane Hall, spokesman for the Malaspina Disarmament Group. "A lot of effort and quite a bit of money, from College and community people, went into those signs. We are still hoping that it is some kind of practical joke and that the large sign will be returned. We're not sure we have the resources to put another in place. What bothers us most about what happened is the thought that there are still people who don't see the urgent need to work for peace, or who perhaps would even like to sabotage the peace movement. That makes us very sad."

## STUDENT INTERNSHIP PROGRAM

IN AN EFFORT TO RESPOND to a growing and urgent need for student summer employment opportunities, Malaspina College, in cooperation with Nanaimo Community Employment Advisory Society, the B.C. Ministry of Labour and Canada Employment and Immigration Commission, Employment Development Branch, is piloting a Student Internship Program. This program is designed to provide career-oriented summer employment for students capitalizing on existing linkages between College programs and their related employment sectors. The 1983 program objective is to create at least 200 positions in both the public and private sector.

Malaspina College intends to create jobs through utilizing job creation funding received through the Federal and Provincial governments. Some of the positions will be fully funded through grants while others will subsidize a wage in the private sector up to \$2.50 per hour. If you are interested in applying for any of the positions created, or know of an employer who would hire you if you were to obtain a wage subsidy, you should register with the Malaspina College Internship Program Office, in the Student Activity Building. This office will open on March 18 and can be reached by calling 754 - 8522.
